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a contemporary follow up to the groundbreaking power of maps this book takes a fresh look at what maps do whose interests they serve and how they can be used in

surprising creative and radical ways denis wood describes how cartography facilitated the rise of the modern state and how maps continue to embody and project the interests of their creators he demystifies the hidden assumptions of mapmaking and explores the promises and limitations of diverse counter mapping practices today thought provoking illustrations include u s geological survey maps electoral and transportation maps and numerous examples of critical cartography participatory gis and map art

prized for its creative design original art and playful accessible writing making maps is now in a thoroughly updated fourth edition the text is restructured to emphasize the importance of the map making process all components of map making are covered and are brought to life in the expanded graphic novella threaded through the text updates include new coverage of data aggregation artificial intelligence feminist and indigenous perspectives map making workflow and more design choices are emphasized and linked to the reasons for making a map featuring more than 80 color illustrations and a unique layout the book includes an annotated map exemplar used throughout the text extensive map examples and a companion website new to this edition new or expanded topics graduated symbol maps multivariate choropleth maps visual storytelling maps and gerrymandering artificial intelligence workflow and more integration of practical ideas from indigenous and feminist perspectives coverage of color and type is shifted earlier in the book and the chapters on map symbolization and abstraction now conclude the book with many compelling new maps the authors demonstrate that maps of the natural physical world are just as culturally and socially constructed as any map of property or territory

this book presents an original study on how contemporary artists are exploring urban spaces through mapping despite a long history of representations of cities in maps and the relationships that can be envisaged between art maps and cities in the contemporary world little research is dedicated to investigating how artists intervene in the realm of urban cartography the research examines a century old history of art maps and draws on academic debates challenging traditional notions of maps as scientific artefacts produced through accurate measurement and surveying the potential of art maps to construct personal narratives through contestation embodiment

and play is analysed in the city context where spaces are shaped by urban planning and design political ideologies and socio economic forces adopting an exploratory and interpretative research approach that investigates the confluence of theories originated in different domains this book conducts the reader to discover what artistic practices can bring into a more creative while inquisitive understanding of cities a series of semi structured interviews with visual artists enquiring how they apprehend process and re create urban spaces in artworks explores cartographic process and methods in visual art practices in the twenty first century which incorporates digital technologies and critical thinking

in these essays the author draws on ideas in art history literature philosophy and the study of visual culture to subvert the traditional positivist model of cartography and replace it with one grounded in an iconological and semiotic theory of the nature of maps

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this book explores how we create deep maps delving into the development of methods and approaches that move beyond standard two dimensional cartography deep mapping offers a more detailed exploration of the world we inhabit moving from concept to practice this book addresses how we make deep maps it explores what methods are available what technologies and approaches are favorable when designing deep maps and what lessons assist the practitioner during their construction this book aims to create an open ended way in which to understand complex problems through multiple perspectives while providing a means to represent the physical properties of the real world and to respond to the needs of contemporary scholarship with contributions from leading experts in the spatial humanities chapters focus on the linked layers of quantitative and qualitative data maps photographs images and sound that offer a dynamic view of past and present worlds this innovative book is the first to offer these insights on the construction of deep maps it will be a key point of reference for students and scholars in the digital and spatial humanities

in this book the main trends concepts and directions in cartography and mapping in modernism and post modernism are reviewed philosophical and epistemological issues are analysed in cartography from positivist empiricist neo positivist and post structuralist stances in general in cartography technological aspects have been considered as well as theoretical issues the aim is to highlight the epistemological and philosophical viewpoint during the development of the discipline some main philosophers who have been influential for contemporary thinking such as immanuel kant ludwig wittgenstein karl popper and bertrand russell are considered none of these philosophers wrote about cartography directly excepting kant but their philosophies are related to cartography and mapping issues the book also analyses the concept of paradigm or paradigm shift coined by thomas kuhn who applied it to the history of science different cartographic trends that have arisen since the second half of the twentieth century are analysed according to this important concept which is implicit inside the scientific or disciplinary communities further the authors analyse the position of cartography in the context of the sciences and other disciplines adopting a positivistic point of view additionally they review current trends in cartography and mapping in the context of information and communication technologies in a post modernistic or post structuralistic framework thus since the 1980s and 1990s new mapping concepts have arisen which challenge the discipline s traditional map conceptions

act theory probed the permeability between fact and fiction it then assesses oppositional interpretations by John Searle and Jacques Derrida and in doing so it explores the fictional aspects within scientific knowledge the book then focuses on five key aspects of the geographical discipline and analyses them using the theories of speech acts and performance the performative aspects of the creation of place speech act performances and geopolitics acts of cartographical construction as variations of speech act performance the performative aspects of the creation of public and private space and finally the history of the discipline as a sequence of performative acts that attempt to establish geography as being constitutive of this or that type of disciplinary method or scientific viewpoint geography speaks is an interdisciplinary text with a distinct and clear focus on cultural geography while also synthesizing into geography ideas germane to historiography the philosophy of language the history of science and comparative literature
